Good-bye Roger



Roger Sawtell was a man who embraced village life and all it had to offer. He loved Hunton where he and Ann lived for 35 years until just before his death in January.

Roger made many friends who remember him as 'such a kind man', 'so welcoming', 'so hard working' and 'always with a smile on his face'. All those who knew him will remember his laugh. As one friend said: 'He had the fruitiest laugh. You could always tell when he was in the room.'

In early years Roger, who had a private pilot's licence, could be seen flying over the village on many a Saturday morning or taking off in the car with his clubs to play a round of golf. In latter years it was his arm chair in his sitting room or, even better, a chair in his summer house which held the greatest attractions.

He loved sitting in his summer house on a balmy evening listening to the birds in the garden and the sheep in the fields.

Above all, Roger liked to be involved in village life.

He served on the Parish Council for 24

years, being Chairman for 19 years. As former clerk, David Swan, remembers, 'Roger was essentially an enabler. He enjoyed living in Hunton and wanted the community to succeed.' He was treasurer on the Parochial Church Council for many years and a trustee of Peace Cottages for nearly 20 years, where he again served as treasurer. He was also involved with the village hall, the club and the school.

Roger and Ann brought up their two daughters, Amy and Lizzie in Hunton, enjoying their family life in the village.

As Roger became older and less mobile, he liked to join in the many events in the club, sitting with a pint, a whisky, or a glass of red wine and greeting everyone with a broad smile, clearly pleased to see all his friends.

In July Roger and Ann moved away from the village to live near their daughters and grandchildren, in Oxfordshire. Roger's memorial service was held at the end of February in St Mary's Church which, despite the fact that they had moved away, Ann knew was what Roger would have wanted.

Pastoral letter

As I write to you this month, we find ourselves in the season of Lent. This ancient Christian season is often characterised by the question 'What are you giving up for Lent?'

When I was about 12, I gave up sweets. I can still recall the joyful breaking of the fast with a packet of liquorice wheels.

I eschewed daytime TV for Lent when my eldest was a baby. What I recall from that time was how much more time I found I had to do both useful and meaningful things, and how much I appreciated the quiet in the house when he was napping – as opposed to filling the quiet space with the noise of the outside world!

As a 12 year-old exploring faith, I didn't really think too deeply about my reasons for my fast – it was more a feat of self-control than an exercise in spiritual growth.

As a young 26 year-old mum, I used the time to pray more, and found it enriching and soul-feeding. But I went back to daytime TV noise after Lent. It didn't produce a lasting shift in my way of life.

I wonder if, rather than asking 'What are you giving up for Lent?' a better question might be 'WHY are you giving up for Lent?'

Often, Lent is used to kick-start some self-improvement that needs to be done, or to break a habit that has a hold on us. While these are valid reasons in many ways – and helpful and positive too - at its heart, the Lenten fast is not about improving 'us' at all. In the Church, we believe it is about focussing our lives on the life of Jesus as we mirror – albeit in a tiny way - the 40 days of fasting that Jesus undertook as he prepared to begin his world-changing ministry on Earth; a ministry that would lead him through the suffering of the cross to the magnificent glory of the resurrection.

It is part of the on-going journey that brings us to the joy of Easter – a reminder and a recognition that our pilgrimage as people here on earth will not always be easy, joyful and abundant; there are hard times to walk through, times where we experience want and frustration. But it's a reminder and an encouragement too – that trying times won't last forever – change is possible... And that hope is at the heart of the message of Jesus.

Psalm 30:5 says 'Sorrow lasts for a night, but joy comes in the morning...'

I pray for us all that we will know true hope in our hearts and lives as we journey through Lent towards the celebration of Easter. Revd Lorna Falkner

Parish Actions on Climate Change & Sustainability

You may feel it is the responsibility of Government and 'Authority' to do something about climate change, but we are all able to act within our own 'footprint', and the Parish Council has also taken steps to consider what can be done at the 'local' level.

Back in April 2019, Maidstone Borough Council declared a 'Biodiversity & Climate Emergency', and undertook to consider what steps the Borough could take to reduce its effects.

Here in Hunton, the topic of 'pressure' on our local rural environment had become a matter of frequent discussion at Parish meetings and the requested addition of 'Climate Change & Sustainability' to the Hunton Parish Agenda was welcomed universally by Councillors, especially in the light of potential flooding and the effects of increasingly volatile weather.

After discussion at a couple of meetings, the Parish Council adopted (in July 2022) a set of Conditions that it would like MBC to consider for any new build or major extension which are:

Provision of renewable energy sources ;

Native Planting in any landscape planning;

Provision of electric vehicle charging points; Swift & bee bricks, or bat/bird boxes;

itive Planting in any landscape planning;

Wildlife friendly boundaries (e.g. hedgehog gaps); Permeable parking and footways ; Higher level thermal insulation and airtightness; Minimal light pollution externally.

These had already, in part, been conditions implied in various planning consents in the Parish by MBC planners in the past couple of years, but it was decided by all to formally adopt such measures.

The second matter the Parish Council has decided is to assess the carbon footprint of its own 'estate', i.e. the playing fields and village hall (although these are run by separate committees). This will allow the Parish to suggest/implement improvements and measure their effectiveness after installation.

We have applied for KCC funding for EV charging points, but just found that we've been unsuccessful in that. We have started planting out a new hedge on one side of the playing field, and have plans to create a small copse there as well. The village hall has recently replaced its ancient electric (bar) heating system with a 50% more efficient heating system, and is now looking at insulation and double glazing. Where we use third parties and external companies, we seek to ensure they are taking the environment into account.

Away from the Parish's own land, we are so lucky to have had a local landowner plant 45,000 trees recently, as well as smaller plantations a few years earlier. We are now starting to assess our wildlife corridors and natural features, such as the many ponds on Redwall Lane (old brickworks pit remnants), with a view to restoring some of these to facilitate nature recovery, and for educational purposes. We are hoping to get our younger schoolchildren involved more deeply in their village environment, including sapling growing for the copse, and perhaps outdoor classroom teaching.

You can Smell Spring in the Air

Have you smelt that earthy scent?

I find it evocative of spring and of days becoming longer and brighter, maybe it is because I notice it more when the air is clear and there is the promise of the sun on your back. The birds are noisier, pairing up and nest building. Do you think they can smell it too? There is a Greek term for it: "Petrichor" meaning 'essence of rock' and it is caused by a bacteria in the soil (Strepomyces) and this is the source of the chemical compound Geosmin.

Geosmin is what you smell as it is released from the soil often after gentle rain or soil disturbance, but we notice it more in the spring because it has been absent for the last few months.

Apparently humans are super sensitive to the smell of geosmin and can detect it better than sharks can blood.

After some two months of delay, Maidstone Borough Council have put their two third-party reports up on their Planning page under MA/20/505751; the response from WeLoveChainhurst has also been posted there, along with Marden Parish's continued objection. There are no new documents/comments from the Applicant. The latest news is that the earliest this may go to Planning Committee is the April meeting (I think that's 2023, but who knows..!)
