Pastoral Letter

The Coronation of King Charles III. The event for which May 2023 will be remembered.

A significant event in the life of our country and of the Church of England, and a huge responsibility for the Archbishop of Canterbury. I am sure this may be counted as one of the most extraordinary events in Justin Welby's time as Archbishop and I am sure he has found himself feeling more than a little daunted as the day approaches. I am sure that King Charles doesn't come to this day without some anxiety either.

It is this that I have decided to write to you about this month; facing the enormous things of life — the opportunities and responsibilities that are a part of our human experience. We are not all going to be anointing and crowning a king this month (thank goodness!) but many of us face things that feel huge to us: GCSE and A-level exams; starting a new job; a family event — getting married or having to plan and process a funeral. In all these things, we have the same resource available to us that the Archbishop has available to him: the presence and strength of God through the power of the Holy Spirit.

And in trusting God with the difficult circumstances of life, he writes that they will know God's peace with them. If you are facing difficult circumstances at this time, or have something daunting on the horizon, may you also come to know God's presence and God's peace with you. Photo History of Hunton

A collection of photos of Hunton taken from 1905 to 1938 which temporarily went missing has now re-emerged to show narrower roads, lower hedgerows, horses and carts being driven up Hunton Hill, rather than cars and lorries, and some wonderful stone walls where none are now visible. There are also photographs of two houses which have since burnt down, a lovely stone bridge on the way to Chainhurst – which was demolished in about 1940 – and two pubs with clientele gathered outside.

It has been suggested that we should also seek to gather other photographs held by homeowners to add to this record – indeed we have already been given a few wonderful images of Hunton Court Farm when it was still a working farm. Thank you Shirley.

We had a rewarding, if slightly depressing, rubbish collection day on Saturday 18th March and are deeply grateful to Clockhouse Farm for removing 82 sacks of rubbish, 8 tyres, a child's bike, a lorry wheel and a wide selection of old furniture and building materials. We are also all indebted to the many volunteers throughout the village who turned out on the day -- and on the days before if they had a diary clash.

We found the usual collection of Ibuprofen / Codeine packets, takeaway food wrappings, beer and Red Bull cans and for a while, the roads looked clear of rubbish. Gardening in May

Now is the time the plants are really growing and the weather is warming up, but there is still a risk of frost. So, keep an eye on the forecast and protect plants that are more tender. Whilst many of us may have lost a few specimens over the winter, now is the time to see if new shoots are coming out before giving up on them and getting out the secateurs.

Spring flowering shrubs can be pruned back after they have flowered but be careful with large dense shrubs. The Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 protects bird's nests, so it is an offence to damage or destroy them. If you are tackling large shrubs, be cautious or leave until after August when the birds will have finished nesting.

Take soft wood cuttings now, finding long enough shoots that are not going to flower. Support herbaceous plants before they start to get too tall and flop over. Choose areas around the garden to leave unmown for insects and other wildlife

In the ponds, newts will be laying their eggs and early frog and toad spawn with be hatching. All your pond maintenance should be done by now but it is a good time to add plants to the pond

Harden-off seedlings and cuttings by exposing them to outside temperatures for part of the day to acclimatise them before finally planting outside.

Finally, don't forget to pot on anything spare for the Plant and Produce Day on Sat 13th May

Hunton Bowls Club

The new bowling season got off to a flying start at the end of April with our usual coffee morning followed by our 'Opening Fling'. We have a full fixture list, league matches, competitions and tournaments all to complete by the end of our very short season in September. At the end of last season the green had been hit hard by the long dry summer, not to mention the moles who had demolished and destroyed the edges of the rinks along with disease caused by worms. During the winter months our men worked tirelessly on the green rebuilding the edges, scarifying and redressing the ground, with a weekly visit in all weathers brushing off the worm casts to allow new growth. The hard work by all has paid off and the green has been restored to its former glory.

At the end of last year South East Water set up a compensation fund of £250,000 due to loss of water and low pressure during the summer months. Hunton was one of the areas affected. Parish Councils could apply on behalf of charities, community groups and not-for-profit organisations. Thanks to the Parish Council who applied for a grant and were awarded funds from SEW which were then subsequently distributed to the Bowls, Cricket and Football Club. On behalf of the Bowls Club the money was gratefully received and put towards a much-needed water pump and sprinkler — another piece of equipment to keep our green in tip-top condition. Calling Hunton Lepidopterists – or anyone with an interest in butterflies and moths

As spring gets underway, the first butterflies (possibly Brimstones) will have emerged from winter hibernation to quicken the pulse of local lepidopterists.

Along with them come their far less appreciated cousins, the moths, who are especially important in terms of pollination. Many moths are already active and later in the year we can look forward to species that are equally as spectacular as butterflies. However, being mainly nocturnal, they are less likely to be spotted feeding from wild and garden flowers.

If you have willowherb in a wild corner of your garden, you may come across the caterpillar of an elephant hawk moth – so named because it resembles a trunk – or the beautiful pink and yellow adult hawk moth slurping nectar from honeysuckle.

So important are moths that local farmers are beginning to show more interest in them. Thanks to a £750 KCC grant, facilitated by local Ward Councillor Simon Webb, Marden Wildlife Group now has three portable moth traps for use on farms in Hunton and Clock House Farms in Coxheath, Hunton, Yalding and beyond.

In May (the date is as yet to be decided, as it is weather dependent) there will be a public moth-trapping session at Clock House Farm to which local people are invited. It really is simple to do – and the moths come in myriad subtle patterns and colours. Anyone in Hunton or surrounding villages is very welcome to join in and help farmers in the process. Trapping on local farms will encourage their efforts to increase biodiversity that can then spill over into our gardens.

Easter Sunday Service with a Difference...

This Easter's Sunday service started as one might hope, with a good turnout, sunshine instead of Monday's downpours and the scent of spring flowers that were adorning the window sills and pedestals of the church. It is customary in Hunton Church, at Easter, to decorate a wooden crucifix with flowers; daffodils and tulips which are handed out to the congregation in the early part of the service. The top of the crucifix can only be reached by climbing up into the pulpit. On this occasion it was Liz Oliver, a member of Hunton's dedicated choir, who was tasked with scaling the steps to place her daffodil on to the cross. If we mention that the pulpit is also decorated with candles, you may start to see where this is going!

As Liz reached up to put her flower in place, the draping sleeve of her choir robe got momentarily caught on the candelabra and before anyone could do anything about it, had caught on fire. To her credit, Liz avoided saying anything blasphemous and calmly exclaimed: "Help! I'm on fire!" The quick actions of Jonny Goddard, James Forster and Iain Simmons – who simultaneously rushed to Liz's aid – prevented things getting out of hand and 'ordinary service' soon resumed.
