#### PASTORAL LETTER FROM DAVID JONES

Another part of the NHS left Coxheath last month as the Emergency Operation Control left after 36 years in the village. Nearly 400 staff are now located in a purpose-built Control Centre at Gillingham with the new Medway Make Ready Centre on the ground floor, the relocated 111 Operations on the top floor and the 999 Centre on the first floor with a wonderful view over the estuary.



For many staff it marks the end of their connection with the Ambulance service with the travel from home increased as many staff travelling in from all around Kent and East Sussex coastal town. For Coxheath it adds to the long list of NHS facilities which have relocated or closed since I came to the village in the 1967. Nothing lasts for ever but we will miss their contribution to the life of the village and to the shops. When things disappear, we sometimes realise their contribution to us all.

That of course is true of everything. We can't live in the past but we can learn from the past and recognise what we have in the present and perhaps acknowledge the good things whilst they are happening and not moan when they go or regret what replaces them.

As we are reminded, we rightly worry but are surrounded by nature which in one sense accepts what it has, responds to what it experiences and often comes back stronger and more beautiful when circumstances change. I remember a wonderful willow tree at school, severally damaged in the great storm, and looking very sorry for itself for a few years but in a very short time we marvelled once again at its beauty. Life goes on, nothing stands still, but it is how we react to change that makes life challenging and also exciting. Face the challenges ahead, recognise what we have and look for the opportunities that changes bring.




#### IN THE GARDEN WITH SARA CUSHING

After the late Summer conditions we encountered in September I felt so sorry for the kids returning to school that first week in 25 degree heat), October really will be much more Autumnal, with chillier nights being the norm. We had a big surprise down on The Smallholding last month, with ducklings being born in the second week! I'd left a patch of nettles for shade for the birds over Summer, so clearly some eggs had



been missed (we collect them for use by the Chefs), and so keeping the little ones warm in the night has been priority and involved a hurried trip to



October is one of my busiest months. Apart from being the last month to be sowing overwintering plants, there is a huge amount of tidying and clearing to be done. Greenhouses should be cleaned thoroughly before any new plantings are stored, and space needs to be made for any tender plants that won't withstand cold temperatures. This is a

monumental task for me as the greenhouse was in complete chaos after a mad Summer, but it's a rewarding one when everything is all orderly and the sowings for next year are neatly laid out and labelled!



#### IN THE BORDERS

Bulbs can be sown, and this is one of my favourite things to do. I love new varieties, especially of tulips and I have to admit the account took a dink last month when one of my favourite suppliers, Farmer Gracy had 20% off. I particularly like the variety 'Lemon Beauty' and will be pairing this with var. 'Black Parrot' which has been around for a while, but which I got at a very good price at the store with the awesome middle aisles. The other half managed to get round the store while I was still sorting through the selections in the entrance!





Hardy annuals like calendula,

hollyhocks and sweet peas can be sown to get a good start on next year, and bedding such as wallflowers can be planted out now. Any tender plants like canna and dahlia should be lifted and stored in a dry, frost-free place. All leaves should be cleared regularly and, if not infected, I put these into a free compost bay to break down for mulch next year.

I always leave fallen apples and the hips on the Rugosa roses for the birds. Roses can be pruned down by half to prevent wind rock as long as it is a dry day and the cuts can heal quickly to prevent infection and if you haven't done so yet, lavenders can be trimmed, as long as frost isn't predicted. Borders can be mulched to insulate roots and any bare roots can be planted, so it's an ideal time to get bare rooted roses and hedging in.

#### In the Veg Patch

Is a lovely mixture of harvesting and sowing! Peas and Broad beans can be sown to give an early start. Aquadulce is a reliable variety which I use for overwintering. Onion 'Toughball' and lettuce 'Stonesay' are also two that I recommend for this time of year, these can go out as soon as the seedlings are big enough to handle. Winter cabbage can also be planted, 'Durham Early' is a good one, and I'm also trialling 'Kalibos', a red cabbage as a winter crop. It grew very successfully in the Summer, so we'll see how this works. I'm looking forward to getting Elephant garlics into beds. This very large, mild variety is amazing when roasted! Squashes and pumpkins can be harvested and the last of the runners. Carrots and parsnips can be lifted and trenched in to store until needed. I dig a trench, lift these and literally replant into a sand/soil mix. This means they are there until required, and the parsnips can catch the frost, which gives a sweeter flavour. Main crop potatoes should be lifted and stored in a cool dark place. Rhubarb can be lifted and split and summer fruiting raspberries can be cut back and mulched.

Looking forward to the first baked apples of the season, and wishing you all a Happy Gardening!

#### **PARISH COUNCIL**

#### Play Area

The play area was discussed and a repair was approved for the Rota Bounce. Concerns were raised as older youths have been seen trying to wrap the new swings around the top of the frame and there is a noticeable increase in the amount of litter being thrown on the ground, making it a more time-consuming job for the contractor to cut the grass.

Geoff was thanked for all his work, keeping the area looking neat and tidy for the enjoyment of the children in the village.

#### Parish Council Website

Councillors discussed HugoFox's intent to charge for the website from October 2023. There are three different packages and it was agreed that the Parish Council would sign up for the Silver Package at a cost of £19.99 a month (+vat). This will mean that residents can still use the Planning Tracker, which would be removed with the Bronze package.

#### Highways Improvement Plan (HIP)

The Parish Council is still trying to progress with items on the HIP relating to speeding and drainage issues around the village. The Clerk has offered to meet with a representative from Kent County Council to discuss the content further.

#### **Finance & Administration Matters**

The External Audit has concluded, with no issues found, the relevant documents have been added to the website and noticeboards. At the meeting, Councillors also approved several policies, which will also be added to the website.

#### **FARLEIGH IN BLOOM**

The West Farleigh in Bloom team have a new project! The area surrounding the bench by The Tickled Trout pub on Lower Road has a beautiful outlook over the fields towards Teston as well as the bench and a village information board. It also had an overgrown area of brambles to the left of the bench which we felt we could enhance with new planting. Maidstone Borough Council had funds available for community groups who wished to add biodiversity and horticultural interest in their local area, so we applied as this fitted our cause perfectly. They agreed and awarded us some money through their 'Love where you live' initiative. Jon Fenlon, the head gardener at Smiths Hall kindly drew up a planting plan and the team set to work to realise the ambition. We have



already cleared the brambles and started to dig over the soil. Next up we will be purchasing the new plants and planting them out. We hope to see the fruits of our labours thrive in the spring.

#### CANINE CORNER with Rebecca -

Spinone Italiano also known as Italian Spinone, Spinone, Italian Griffon, Italian Wire-Haired Pointer, and Italian Coarsehaired Pointer.





Spinone means "thorn," which is a reference to the wiry coat that can withstand brambles and twigs etc when flushing out game. The Spinone Italiano is one of the oldest hunting dog breeds in existence. This ancient breed is believed to have been developed as far back as 1000 BC from crosses between indigenous breeds and

those brought into Italy by Celtic tribes in the Piedmont region of Italy. They were originally bred for hunting water fowl. This dog is classified as a rare breed but gaining huge popularity as a healthy, loving, loyal family companion dog. Spinoni Italiani are considered the least problematic dog of their kind when it comes to overall health They're friendly toward everyone, but due to their prey drive may still chase small animals and cats! While working this dog is a tireless tracker, but at home, they're laid back, patient and love nothing more than being in the company of their family laying on the sofa. I have a wonderful girl called Willow who comes to me 3 days a week. She is one of the most loving dogs I look after. She's very sociable with other dogs but due to her size and clumsiness she can accidentally stand on the smaller dogs and so then they sometimes try to avoid her.

She loves nothing more than a cuddle, but better than that, a cuddle and a sausage. Her appetite is huge.

The Spinone has a considerable beard, and also loves water so you can be assured that after her nose hits the bottom of the drinking bowl blowing bubbles from her nose her beard is suitably soaked and promptly trots over to show me by resting her head on my shoulder. But despite her tsunami beard she makes an excellent companion and brings a smile to everyone who meets her.

#### Common summer ailments in dogs.

I recently had a Cocker Spaniel to stay and noticed that she had a bit of a whiff about her. I recognised the smell as a 'Hot Spot'. What is a hot spot? Hot spots also known as wet eczema or moist dermatitis, are a painful condition where the skin becomes reddened, moist, itchy and swollen. Usually a result of allergies, an infection, parasites or just moisture trapped within the coat. It's not always easy to spot under the coat but other symptoms may include licking, scratching, biting and a smelly discharge of pus and fluid.

Luckily they can be treated easily by clipping the fur around the affected area, cleaning with an antibacterial solution such as 'Hibiscrub' and keeping the area dry. If the area is really sore and large you may need to consult your vet for some oral antibiotics or steroids/antihistamines.






#### FLYING around FARLEIGHS

#### You'll be late for school if you don't hurry up!!

How often is that heard in households around the villages? Having just one child is sometimes a challenge before they reach the age (do some of them ever) of getting themselves sorted out in the morning and ready for the day ahead.

Spare a thought, then, for birds with large broods. Although their young don't need to be dressed every morning, they can appear just



Naturally they wouldn't line up in orderly fashion, or even stay on branch. They regularly jostled, pushed, and shoved for position, hoping to be first in line for the next helping of insects being brought by the adults. In the natural world a single parent wouldn't cope with rearing such a large family, even though these birds have only to do it for a couple of months.

But this species has evolved its own Social Support system that will be familiar to some hardpressed human families; older siblings, uncles, and aunts all help with rearing the young. So, these



youngsters couldn't be sure which direction their next mouthful was going to come from! By the time you read this, these young birds will have progressed to the next stage of growing up, akin to the human 'teenager'. They will have joined up with other families of Longtailed Tits, with newly

forged friends of other species like larger Blue and Great Tits and diminutive Goldcrests, to roam the neighbourhood in noisy flocks.

Their equivalent of a McDonalds or Pizza Hut where they gather to hang out and strew scraps of food over the ground will be your garden feeders. But don't expect them to tidy up after themselves – there is as much chance of that as a teenage human tidying their bedroom!
