### **CANINE CORNER WITH REBECCA**

I'm sure most of you enjoyed watching Crufts in March, I know I did. One breed I noticed being entered as a rarity there days was the Foxhound.

A total of 2,847 dogs were entered in Crufts 2024 and there was a mere 5 Foxhounds entered into the world-famous competition this year, as opposed to the Golden Retriever who had as many as 538!

As a girl growing up in the countryside I remember seeing many Foxhounds about. Hearing the Hunters horn or a "Trompe d' Orleans" - used to indicate losing a fox in covert - was a sound I got used to on a Sunday morning.



As I got older and understood that this sound was associated with the fleeing fox I soon started to resent it. Fox hunting, which was once a popular and widely practiced sport, has faced increased scrutiny and regulation in many countries and has thankfully been banned in the UK in 2004 but with this the decline in Foxhounds has become apparent. Foxes were referred to as 'beasts of the chase' in medieval times, along with red deer, and



the earliest known attempt to hunt foxes with hounds was in Norfolk, England, in 1534 where farmers began chasing foxes down with their dogs for the purpose of pest control. The Breed is believed to be a descendant of various English hunting hounds, such as the Greyhound, the Bulldog, and the Fox Terrier.

For those hunters who had previously tracked deer, which required large areas of open land, foxes and hares became the prey of choice in the seventeenth century, with packs of hounds being trained specifically to hunt. England's oldest fox hunt, which is still running

today, is the Bilsdale Hunt in Yorkshire, established by George Villiers, the Duke of Buckingham in 1668.



Nowadays their hunting prowess and endurance have made them versatile working dogs in various fields. They are commonly used in search and rescue operations due to their exceptional scenting abilities and ability to cover large areas quickly. Some Foxhounds are even employed as therapy dogs, providing comfort and companionship to individuals in hospitals, nursing homes, and other care facilities.

As pets, they require regular exercise to channel their energy and prevent destructive behaviour. Being active dogs, with high energy they thrive in homes with spacious gardens or access to open spaces where they can run and play. Their friendly and sociable nature makes them well-suited for families with children and other pets. However, due to their high prey drive potential owners should be prepared to invest time and effort into training and socialising them from an early age to ensure they grow into well-behaved and balanced dogs.

# FLYING around FARLEIGHS

### FLYING MILKMAIDS? SURELY NOT.

It can't all be down to April Fool Day, but this the month that confusion reigns. Not so much in the bird world, although many different – and some rarely seen because they migrate under cover of darkness – species are returning to breed.



But the world of plants is rife with confusion: umpteen country names for the same species, even from one village to the next, and even more associated folklore about their power to

cure, kill, fertilise, predict, protect, or feed us.

This plant, an even earlier opener this year in response to our rapidly heating climate, is *Cardamine pratensis* and was snapped locally by Lou Carpenter. It's regaled by an assortment of names depending on where the viewer hales from: Milkmaids, Lady's Smock, Cuckoo Flower and no doubt many more.

According to the Kent Wildlife Trust: The common name 'Lady's-smock' arises from the cupped shape of the flowers. However, 'smock' was once a slang term for a woman and the name may have alluded to certain springtime activities in the meadows!

If this allusion to a widespread country

pastime of yesteryear means what I think it does (do any lads and lasses – aka blokes and smocks, I suppose - frolic in meadows anymore?), then there is another etymological connection with Cuckoo Flower and cuckold.

Folklore has it that these flowers emerge as Cuckoos return to breed, traditionally on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of the month, St George's Day as well as Shakespeare's birthday.

The cuckoo of course is well known for 'cuckolding' small birds when laying its own egg in their nest. Early scientists had many fanciful ideas (all of them wrong) about the cuckoo's lifestyle, but no real understanding about its egg-laying.

Not until, that is, 1788 when Edward Jenner (the country doctor famous for his work on inoculation against smallpox) published the first observed account of what we now know really does happen. Even back then it was poo-pooed by respectable scientists and wasn't full accepted for a century or so.



Nowadays, of course, most people have watched it happening on TV to the hushed tones of a David Attenborough voiceover. You can see the extraordinary behaviour of the Cuckoo and it's chick on BBC Earth, just browse **Cuckoo Hijacks Warbler Nest** 

So if you come across a 'bloke with a smock' in the meadow, don't disturb them. They're probably watching it in real life.



### **ASIAN HORNET UPDATE**

Local beekeepers are on high alert to spot Asian Hornets as the queens emerge from hibernation. This is likely to be in March. Asian Hornets are an invasive species and pose a major threat to British honeybees and wild pollinators. Since 2016 there have been 101 confirmed sightings and 78 of them were in 2023. Over 40 of these 2023 sightings were in Kent. Where nests have been found, they have been destroyed by the National Bee Unit but, given the rise in sightings, it's very likely that some of the queens will succeed in overwintering this year. We need to spot them and deal with them before they found nests. Laddingford and District Beekeeping Club sent one of our members to Jersey, where the Asian Hornet is already established, to get hands-on experience with local beekeepers of identifying, tracking and destroying Asian Hornet nests. We've been passing this knowledge on to other Kent clubs. The club will be making large quantities of traps to put in areas of previous hornet activity or where there are unconfirmed sightings.

At up to 3cm, Asian hornets are much bigger than wasps (and slightly smaller than our native hornets). They have a darker body than native hornets but the real giveaway is their distinctive yellow legs. If you see one, take a photo or trap it if you can. Report it on the Asian Hornet Watch app, tell a local beekeeper or contact us on <a href="mailto:Chair@laddingfordbeekeepers.co.uk">Chair@laddingfordbeekeepers.co.uk</a>. If you haven't managed to get a photo or trap your suspected Asian Hornet, contact us on the above email and we can set out bait traps to check out the location.
