#### Hunton SpeedWatch

Apologies for writing again so soon after the 2023 update. As the warm weather approaches it would be helpful to have more volunteers trained and available for the village SpeedWatch (which only takes place on West Street). Although we have six active volunteers we usually go out with three or four observers. Two people cannot manage mornings or evenings which we think are busy traffic and speeding times. One volunteer comes from Headcorn and with Marden & Yalding SpeedWatches both being recently revived more volunteers would really help.

Just to update on speeder numbers we have been out just ten times in the past five months to May, three at the Hall and seven at the Club. We have 'clocked' thirty nine speeders. Twenty-nine at the Club passing at 35+ mph and ten at the Hall passing at 46+ mph. Two of those cars passed the Club entrance at 45mph and received a different letter from the Police. For one of them it was the third time they had passed the Club at speed. That person will be receiving a personal letter delivered by a police officer next time! We also had the SpeedWatch PC at the Hall during May and he used his hand-held gun to catch two more drivers leaving the village. Generally, it would appear that the primary purpose of SpeedWatch as a deterrent effect is working as we are getting less numbers exceeding the speed limit on West Street however as noted above we think more effort needs to be made on traffic outside school hours. #### Hunton's Neighbourhood Watch Scheme

Research in the UK shows that Neighbourhood Watch areas are associated with a 10% decrease in property crime when compared to similar areas - British Crime Survey data. Huntonwatch was set up in 2013, covers the whole village and currently has over 100 members. Membership is free and all we require from you to join is your name, address and contact details. We do not share these with anyone (even the police) without your permission. Huntonwatch has a dedicated email address and phone number; is registered with the National Neighbourhood Watch scheme and with Kent Police. We are currently planning to update our Facebook page. We supply NHW window stickers, UV marker pens and 'stay safe' information booklets for members. A Neighbourhood Watch scheme is primarily set up for the prevention of crime and whilst this remains a key element of the support we provide, it is by no means our only focus. In the last eleven years we:

- Provided a prescription collection and medication delivery service during the pandemic
- Established a network of 4x4 vehicle owners willing to help during snow or flood
- Informed members of local road closures
- Notified members of new and/or particularly sophisticated scams
- Kept members informed about criminal or suspicious activities in Hunton and neighbouring villages
- Reported matters to police as necessary and gave advice on contacting the police directly if more appropriate
- Liaised with the local PCSO
- Helped rescue a trapped horse and aided the return of lost dogs to their owners

#### **News of Newts in Hunton**

Last year you may recall an article about the Parish carrying out surveys for great-crested newt (GCN) populations in four pond locations around Redwall Lane and George Street without success. This April we carried out further surveys in two private ponds in East Street. The specialist surveyors from Medway Valley Countryside did find evidence of lots of newt eggs in two of the ponds, including a substantial number of GCN eggs which are individually laid on water mint leaves. The female newt folds the leaf to seal the egg for hatching. They didn't find any newts in the overnight 'bottle traps' but one resident was able to show pictures taken in earlier years of GCNs near their house. Sadly one being rather flattened upon the tarmac – "newtered"!

There are three types of newts: GCN, Palmate & the most common one - Smooth. Since last year's article other residents have reported newts of various types in their ponds in locations off West Street. It would seem that Hunton actually has widespread newt populations of all three species. With three new ponds being developed on private land near Bishops Lane we can hope for more widespread distribution. Newts don't spend that much time in ponds during the breeding time in Spring. They are often found hibernating under log piles and old sheets of galvanised metal. GCNs don't like running water or ponds with fish as their eggs can be fish/toad/tadpole food. #### **Old Curiosities at The Old Curiosity Shop**

Hunton Walking Group chose London to celebrate their 250th walk. Most of us travelled from Paddock Wood meeting up with others at Cannon Street, the start of our walk. We passed Mansion House, Royal Exchange, Bank of England, The Guildhall (construction began in 1411) which is on the site of a Roman amphitheatre and St Paul's. Further along we came across Ye Olde Cheshire Cheese pub which definitely warranted a visit. The area that was most interesting and little visited by most of us was the Temple which includes the four inns of court, the Middle Temple and the Inner Temple, plus the Temple Church, the name of which derives from The Order of the Knights Templar. This order was established by monks in 1118 for the purpose of protecting pilgrims. We saw the Criminal Court and the Royal Courts of Justice where the ultimate legal power of England and Wales resides. Currently there are 60 courts in use including the



Court of Appeal, the High Court and the Crown Court. Continuing on we passed the headquarters of the Women's Suffragette Movement, this is located within the grounds of the LSE. Close by is The Old Curiosity Shop, a building dating back to 1567 but the shop name was only added after Dickens' novel was released as it was thought to be the idea for his description of the antique shop. We continued on at a leisurely pace through Lincoln Inns Fields. a lovely green space in the heart of London and being well used by dog walkers and workers enjoying their lunch. We then passed the original Patent Office, the London Silver Vaults enroute to Chancery Lane and the end of our walk.

#### **Hunton Orchard**

Hunton is fortunate to have its own small community orchard tucked neatly between the Bowls Club and Hunton Engineering. This was set up as part of the Parish Plan in 2011 and made good use of an area which was overgrown. With the help of The Heritage Lottery Fund and Kent Orchards for Everyone we were able to get funding for the trees and fencing for the land. The Parish Council and Hunton Engineering provided the seating and it is now the perfect space for relaxing. The orchard has been maintained by a small group of volunteers who prune the trees and mow the grass. As a group we meet about three times a year (normally Sundays). Starting the year we meet for pruning and hedge trimming and occasionally in autumn for a final clear up before winter. During the growing season we take turns to mow the grass, which takes about an hour.
