For those of you who like DRAGONS there is one in Rochester Cathedral! It's name is Draco Roffensis. It's made up of lots of foil scales; silver, gold and bronze, that were decorated by children and adults who visited the Cathedral earlier in the year. It is well worth a look, and it is free to get in the Cathedral. (What attractions are free these days?!) The Rochester Dragon has been inspired by illuminated artwork found within the pages of Textus Roffensis, a 900 year old medieval book that can be seen in the crypt. There are also free Family Craft Activities at the Cathedral on Tuesdays and Fridays in July and August, and a free Family Friendly Organ Recital on 26th August. Music inspired by Draco Roffensis. Guess what, the organ has 3,808 pipes! Amazing! A free, daily Anglo-Saxon Riddle Trail, too, to help you discover more about the Cathedral. School Trip



The Box Tree Caterpillar

The box tree moth (Cydalima Perspecalis) is now considered a common resident in the UK and is particularly prevelent in the southeast. It was reported as being established in continental Europe at least 10 years ago, so it was only a matter of time before it naturally reached the UK.

Our box hedge succumbed to the caterpillar but I left it hoping the birds would reduce the population of caterpillar, thinking nature would create its own balance as we have so many nesting blue tits in the garden. Little did I know that these caterpillars, whilst devouring the box extremely quickly, take in the poisons from the plant that makes them apparently toxic for wildlife and birds to eat. Though this is now in some debate as birds have been seen to be eating them...maybe when they are still small and have not themselves consumed too much box. So, in the main, these caterpillars it seems have few natural predators. This means left untreated they will kill the plant.

My half dead box did start to sprout some new green shoots early this year, but in no time at all the whole lot succumbed to the caterpillar. It all looked completely dead and I decided to remove it completely. Having cut it right down I found it has started to sprout at the base. I shall leave it and see what happens, not least because attempting to remove the roots is likely to demolish the dry-stone wall it is growing on top of!

We will treat this autumn to ensure nothing overwinters and hope for the best next year, bearing in mind that we may need to treat the plant early enough to attack the first generation of moth at around the beginning of April and again at the end of the month. There is a bio pesticide that uses a bacterium that infects the caterpillar and kills it. This can only be applied by someone who has the PA1 and PA6 certificate. The alternatives are other pesticides, obtainable from garden centres.

I have started off some plants of both Ilex Crenata and Euonymus Japonica to form into balls instead.

Well done to the volunteers, including the organisers, the flower providers, the scones, cakes and savoury makers and all who made the Church so welcoming.
