Pastoral Letter

'Someday, I would like to go home. The exact location of this place, I don't know, but someday I would like to go.'

I read these words by a writer called Henry Rollins the other day and it made me stop and think about what 'home' really means

A house can be a home. But a home is so much more than the place where we sleep at night, or eat our meals. It's the place we live. The place where we can be ourselves.

For me, there are some people who are home too, because when I am with them I breathe out; let my guard down; I can rest in their presence - I know I am safe.

But we are all too aware that life doesn't stand still: we lose loved ones; relationships move on; circumstances press in. And the safe feeling of home can feel a long way away from us.

A couple of items of interest were discussed at the PC meeting on Monday night (18th November).

The terms of reference for the Hunton Safer Streets and Lanes Group were adopted by the council. This group will tie together all the various ideas for desired improvements to the roads around Hunton, along with public meetings to gain further comments from parishioners. Councillor Simmons is heading this group, so look out for future open sessions.

The other main item for discussion was the MBC Gypsy, Traveller and Travelling Show People Development Plan consultation document. The preferred approaches contained in this will have an impact on Hunton, so the PC will be holding a further meeting to formulate a response to it. An Unwelcome Anniversary

After 50 years of marriage a Golden Wedding is celebrated but sadly the 50th Anniversary of the tower roof of our Grade 1 listed church is proving a less happy occasion.

A casual passer-by may not notice that the tower roof is covered with cedar shingles and you would have to look carefully to see that over the last 50 or so years woodpeckers have been pecking a lot of wood! There are holes, some a couple of inches in diameter, in the flat surfaces and the ridge tiles have been seriously degraded in places. This allows damp to penetrate and risks rotting the underlying structure whilst also providing encouragement to all manner of wood eating beetles which in turn provide more reason for the woodpeckers to attack the roof covering which then lets in more water an unhappy circle of life.

We have not been helped by one further piece of bad news. Deathwatch and other wood boring beetles have recently been found to be active in four areas inside the church. Treatment is scheduled to be carried out before the Christmas Market so I hope that will be one issue we can resolve before Christmas!

For the tower, having taken appropriate advice, we have instructed a local architect to manage what we expect to be at least a £100,000 project. You may ask how we, with a congregation of about 20, can possibly expect to meet this cost? It is a question we will be struggling to address over the coming months but we hope a solution can be found.

St Mary's has some money put by for future repairs and emergencies (thanks to a few legacies and regular fundraising events); the Friends of St Mary's have also been fund raising for many years now and, together, we can raise about half of the projected total cost. This helps us in seeking further support from the many bodies willing to help maintain old churches. We hope this will prove fruitful.

The depressing thought is that, as cedar shingles last for about 50 years, in or about 2074 someone from Hunton will be going through the same unhappy exercise – we wish them every success!
