For a few years now I've had a lovely long letter, once a month, from a lady who used to live in Coxheath but now lives in a retirement community in London. Now, she gets her carer to write, her scribe as she describes her. So, I often wonder, as I read her letters, what the scribe must be thinking as the two 'ancients' share memories. Her memories are clear, happy in some ways but there were also the worrying times while her children grew up, letters so full of life and memories.

Well, I wasn't going to say anything this month as I felt depressed by so much happening, locally, nationally and internationally. But then, her letter arrived, full of memories and hope! I share, with you, the thought: that when we get older and our joints remind us of the years, life is still worth living. We have rich memories of the past and those who remind us of them! As the evenings draw in, don't be in a rush to pull the curtains and turn on the light. Sit still and dwell for a moment or two and the memories will come back as darkness falls.

The day thou gavest, Lord, is ended, The darkness falls at Thy behest, To thee our morning hymns ascended, Thy praise shall sanctify our rest.

## A Celebration for the Life of Gilly Devas

Our dear friend Gilly passed away peacefully at home, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> September 2025. She was lovingly looked after by her family, carers, and Daisy her dog, in the house that she loved. Her friends and family will miss her, especially her children Laura, Kim and Jordi and her stepdaughter Annabel, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Gilly doted on her family. By the time this article is published, the service to celebrate her life, on the 22<sup>nd</sup> September, will have taken place. I know that many people will have attended the service because Gilly was respected and loved by so many.

Gilly was a graceful and dignified lady, part of a past generation that contributed significantly to the life and history of this village. Gilly was born on the 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1932; she spent her early childhood years in India, returning to England for her education. Following her first marriage, to Charles Smith-Bingham, she later married Michael Campbell Devas, MC. of Hunton Court, where she lived happily until Michael's death in 2007.

Her legacy lives on in our memories, as well as by her substantial contributions to projects and charities. In particular, aiding the restoration of the ancient stained-glass windows in St Mary's Church and by her involvement with Hunton School. Her enduring support of St Mary's, and the school, remained throughout her life, being underpinned by her strong Christian values and high regard for education. During the late 1990s she became a lay Ofsted Inspector and for many years, she was a governor at Hunton School. The pupils have benefitted considerably from her generosity, goodwill and time. Gilly loved to take her beloved dogs, Daisy and Dillon, to school. Even in her latter days, she adored the children's singing visits to her home.

Gilly loved music, entertaining and socialising. How we remember 'Musicals on the Green' when Gilly let her hair down and was one of the first up to dance with us! She loved the village pantomimes, and was incredibly supportive, buying the first of so many of our own lights for the productions. For many years, she coordinated Hunton's 'Royal British Legion's poppy collection.

I will remember Gilly, for her close friendship and quietly cheeky sense of humour! She had such a special way of approaching friends, showing a sincere interest in them. She always remained positive and hopeful, with an un-wavering sense of loyalty. Gilly's kindness and dignity will remain always in my thoughts. As others have also said, she was: "A very special lady," "We were honoured to have known her." A wonderful person who gave so much and was such a lot of fun to be with."

### Gardening Club go Down to the Farm.

On the 10<sup>th</sup> September, 18 members of the Gardening Club donned walking boots and wellies for a tour around Horlands Farm in Marden. The tour was led by 5<sup>th</sup> generation farmer, Richard Russell. Richard was very keen to explain both the joys and challenges of farming today and happily answered the many questions put to him. Horlands is an interesting combination of a traditional family mixed farm which has incorporated environmental projects to increase its biodiversity.

We began by sheltering from the rain in the cowshed, while Richard gave us details of birds spotted (70 different species) on the farm's 125 acres. Some of their current projects include rainwater harvesting to provide drinking water for the livestock. As the rain eased, we set off to see the sheep and this year's lambs and year-old calves who were just as curious about us as we were about them! Further on, we walked along some of the 4 miles of hedgerow, loaded with winter berries, planted to divide up the land and to provide a habitat and food for birds and other wildlife. In one corner, completely left wild, there was the biggest bug hotel, shaped like a 'Swiss Chalet', we had ever seen! Several fields had recently received their annual dose of muck (from the cows overwintering in the barn and livery horses) to fertilise the pasture for next year's grazing and hay thus eliminating the need for chemical fertilisers. In addition to traditional farming, there are livery stables for up to 15 horses with state-of-the-art stabling and a very popular dog walking field.

Richard explained the challenges of the long, hot, dry summer, as it had reduced yields of hay by a third. Also, the grass had not grown sufficiently to support the livestock, so they were already being given winter feed. Many thanks go to Richard for such an interesting and informative afternoon and to Lesley and Roger Lee for arranging this fascinating visit and for supper at the club afterwards.

### Rubbish Trends?

As many of you will know MBC will not collect litter from our roads because they consider it to be too dangerous. Instead, they send an occasional road sweeper but, whilst this no doubt collects some litter, it cannot collect rubbish in the hedgerows and on the verges. We hold two litter collecting days a year and we held our most recent one on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> August. Thank you to our volunteer litter pickers, Clockhouse Farm who collect and dispose of the rubbish collected and to the Parish Council who fund the purchase of bags and litter pickers. On this occasion we were delighted that we only had to pick up 40 sacks of rubbish together with some gas cannisters, car parts and old kitchen items (our lowest haul for three years). This may be partly because the grass and foliage hide items at this time of year (two months earlier than last year), also because there are those of you who now collect rubbish as part of your daily walks around the village – thank you too!

Findings this year include a £5 note (in need of a good wash) and empty boxes of prescription medicine linked to the regular and deliberate dumping of household waste on one of the most dangerous roads in the village. This evidence has been passed on to MBC who we trust will take action to end this antisocial behaviour. On a lighter note, one of the team has collected over 400 Red Bull cans on Hilltop this year! We were asked to count our own tally on our litter picking day: 115 were collected on Hunton Hill, 24 on West Street and a further 11 from the upper reaches of Barn Hill and North Folly Road to make a round 150 counted but perhaps 200 collected in one day when you consider roads for which we don't have numbers!
