Pastoral Letter

For many of us November is the month of reflection and looking back. This is probably because of Remembrance Day on the 11th, and this year on the 9th, Remembrance Sunday. Both these days provide the opportunity for us to reflect on all those who have died in the first and second world wars – those ancestors that we may never have known – as well as remembering those who have died in the many other conflicts that have happened since.

This seems particularly poignant when, as I write, our news is full of the potential for the end to the war in Gaza. By the time you read this there may be peace.... we can only hope! And that's the point, as we look back at the names of those who've lost their lives in conflicts we can be filled with sadness but also with hope. The hope that this time maybe things will be different, this time maybe we will learn the lessons and not inflict pain and suffering on others again.

The names of those who've died may be engraved on a stone monument for all to see, or they may be engraved solely on your heart, but wherever those names are, as we look back, we can be grateful for the sacrifices that brought peace to the nations again.

This time of looking back, reflecting on the past, gives us the opportunity to think how we can affect the world and make it a better place on an individual scale. Not many of us can affect governments directly, but we can take responsibility for our own actions. We can choose to treat those we meet with kindness; we can choose to treat others with respect, we can choose the words we use and the way we say things and very soon, if we all begin to treat others the way we would like to be treated, we may find that the world is becoming a better place to live.

For Christians this is choosing to live our lives like Jesus, calling out injustice and unkindness whilst treating others with care and respect, putting their needs before our own. It's not an easy to choice to make in a world that seems to value self above all others.

But just as the butterfly effect says that small actions can have consequences miles away, maybe, just maybe, we can create a cascade of kindness spreading out across the world that everyone can join in with.... it's got to be worth a try, hasn't it?

Road Closed Ahead

The highways department can't win, can they? The other month we were informed Road Closed Ahead at Linton corner going in the direction of Hastings. I got to All Saints church and still no road closed. Where was it closed? No, not Cranbrook nor Hawkhurst but Knoxbridge. Garden tips for November

Collect up the leaves to make leaf mould. It can take a couple of years to mature but makes excellent compost for mulching when it is ready. Either, using chicken wire, make a cage and leave it open to the elements but watering it if it gets too dry, or alternatively fill black plastic sacks with the leaves and water before sealing and leaving it for a year or two.

Cover garden ponds to prevent leaves falling into the water but ensure that the wild animals and birds can still have access to drinking water

Have your water butts and receptacles cleaned and ready to capture rainwater.

Protect plants in pots by bringing the tender ones indoors or into a greenhouse. Wrap up plants with fleece or bubble wrap if they are tender but too large to move indoors.

Prevent plants in pots outside from getting waterlogged during heavy bouts of rain. Raise the pots off the ground with bricks or special feet and remove any trays and dishes from underneath them so that water can drain freely.

Protect the roses from their roots rocking in severe winds by doing a basic prune to reduce the height of the plant prior to the final prune in the Spring. Climbing roses can be pruned and tied in now.

Hunton Ladies are Bewitched

Councillor Claire Kehily entranced the Hunton Ladies at their September meeting with a talk about the Maidstone Witch hangings. She recounted the history of "witches" who were, hundreds of years ago, the "wise" women who local people consulted for herbal remedies to cure their health problems. Over the centuries these women with their healing powers gradually became feared and against a backdrop of religious fervour were thought to be malicious and in league with the devil. They were persecuted and brought to trial. In 1632 six "witches" were hanged on a part of Penenden Heath called Gallows Hill. Claire has undertaken much research into the local history of these maligned women, and although not extensively touched on here, her delivery left all the ladies intrigued. She has a petition going to have a memorial erected in Maidstone to remember these women who were so unjustly persecuted and hanged.

Down Another History Rabbit Hole!



In the church there is a photograph of a knight's helm (early word for helmet), that was made in the second half of the 16th century and which belonged to Sir Thomas Fane of Burston (now Buston) Manor. Having been stolen from the church and then recovered in 1969, it is now kept in the Guildhall Museum, Rochester. I asked if I could view the item and take some new photographs so that we have more up to date records of what is held there and they were happy to oblige.

Before going, I thought I ought to know something of the man whose helm it was, finding that Sir Thomas was born in about 1540. He was educated at Maidstone Grammar School, knighted for services to Parliament and died in 1606. Otherwise, he was less interesting than his older brother, who was also called Sir Thomas! This older Thomas was born 1538

and, aged 16, took part in the Thomas Wyatt rebellion against Queen Mary in 1554. He was caught, incarcerated in the Tower of London for four months and was then fortunate to be pardoned on account of his youth.

There are Fane memorials in the church carrying their coat of arms, which include three striking golden gauntlets. The right to include these on their coat of arms was apparently granted after a Welsh soldier, called John Fane, was one of three men who captured and held for ransom the French King, John II during the Battle of Poitiers in 1356. The ransom took France eight years to raise, and John was awarded a share, securing the Fane family fortune for generations to come.

Hunton had other connections with the Wyatt Rebellion, in that Sir Thomas Wyatt owned Hunton Court. He was only 32 when he was beheaded at the Tower and then quartered in April 1554!
