Hidden History

As I walked down the path to the church, I noticed that there were some new molehills at the side of the path. Scattering the earth, I found a coin. Cleaned of mud it proved to be a 1917 halfpenny ... from Australia! How did it get there I wondered.

I thought I might get an answer by searching for people born in Hunton who then emigrated to Australia before returning to Europe to fight in WW1. I could only find one such person, a Robert Leonard Stanley whose father was a gardener at Hunton Court and who lived in a cottage on West Street, a few doors down from the entrance to The Square.

Robert served in the British Navy 1898 – 1902, got married in 1903 and emigrated to Australia before joining the Australian Army in Perth in 1916. His troopship left Freemantle on 23rd December and arrived in Plymouth on 17th February 1917. He was shot in the left buttock and through the right thigh on 25th September 1917, returning to the UK to convalesce. Could he have visited family and friends while here? Would he have had a 1917 Australian coin in his pocket at the time? Or could it have been dropped by another visitor years later? We will never know but it was a fun hunt!

In one of life's strange coincidences, I met a relative of Robert's earlier this year on a visit they were making from Australia to look at family history. I have sent them details of my find and I perhaps they may be able to provide some further background in due course.

Hunton Wanderers CC end of season report 2025

2025 has been generally successful for the club. During the early part of the season we were able to recruit a number of new players and as a result we started strongly, fielding full strength 1st and 2nd teams on a weekly basis. However when the dreaded holiday season came upon us in July and August, numbers fell away and our second team were forced to concede a couple of games due to a shortage of personnel. The situation wasn't helped by injuries to some regular players.

Notwithstanding, our first team were able to consolidate their early season performances and, in a very tight finish, won their division and gained promotion to the Kent League Div 9.

You might think that we would be happy with this, but there has been a groundswell of dissatisfaction with the Kent League over the past few years, in the main due to having to play more games in urban settings, on lower quality wickets and against teams whose discipline can be questionable.

As a result, a poll amongst club members has almost unanimously voted to move leagues, and in 2026 we will venture for the first time into the Kent County Village League, which offers competitive cricket in more rural settings. We will be joining our fellow teams at Bearsted and West Farleigh, as well as a number of sides in the Tonbridge and Sevenoaks areas. We are very much looking forward to the experience, as it will mesh with our own ethos of playing competitive but good humoured cricket, on lovely village grounds.
