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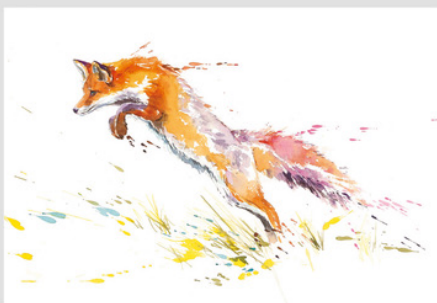

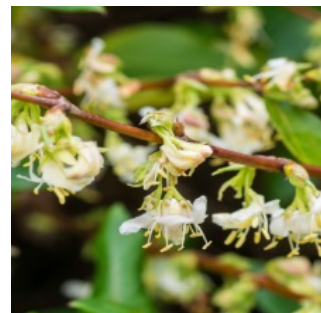
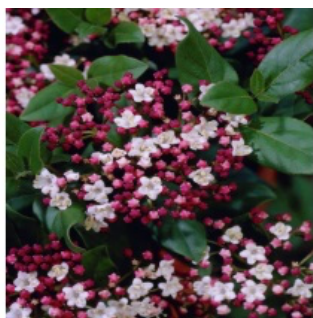
DECEMBER GARDENING NOTES

December can be a really busy time of year, with the shortest day on the horizon and lots of planning for the forthcoming Christmas celebrations, so why not grab a few hours and immerse yourself in the fresh air to do those odd jobs out in the garden.... not only for some exercise but also a great deal of satisfaction!

Empty the last of the summer flowering pots and get creative by planting them up with seasonal colour for the winter months. Fill with fresh compost to provide well-needed nutrients, and water in the new plants. Most peat-free composts will sink after a while so top up the soil level to protect any roots that may have become exposed from the harsh weather. If a freeze is forecast, water directly around the base of the plants 2-3 days prior as moist soil absorbs and retains more heat than dry soil, however take care to avoid wetting the leaves if possible.

Plant bare root trees, shrubs, roses and hedging. Evergreen species provide habitats and food for wildlife as well as adding structure in the winter garden.

Winter-flowering shrub are invaluable at this time of the year, not only for their scent but visually too – Viburnum tinus, Hamamelis (witch hazel), Sarcococca (Christmas box), Skimmia japonica and Lonicera fragrantissima (winter-flowering honeysuckle) are some of the many species available.



On a rainy day, take to the greenhouse and give it a winter spruce up! This is one of the essential tasks for early winter. Clear out any old pots and dead material and wash everything with a suitable greenhouse disinfectant. This will deter fungi and parasitic insects and give you a good start for next year. If you are overwintering plants ventilation is important to keep them in optimum health, so even at this time of year open the windows or vents on a regular basis to ensure that the air inside does not become stagnant.

If you are using water from a water butt or outside tap on your plants, then fill some watering cans and leave them inside the greenhouse for a couple of days so that the water becomes the same temperature as your plants – if you use it straightaway you run the risk of using ice cold water and shocking the plants.

Start to prune apple and pear trees whilst they are in the period of dormancy, usually up to the end of February. Do not prune stone fruits such as cherry, plum and greengage until springtime! Prepare empty vegetable beds by weeding and manuring – either dig it in or simply on top of the beds for the worms to do their work.

Plan ahead and write a Christmas list to send to the man with the red coat and big white beard.....small hand tools, essential gloves, seeds and seed organiser, perhaps a gardening journal to record all of your aspirations and successes!

WHAT TO DO IF YOUR BELOVED DOG GOES MISSING.

There has been an influx of missing dogs in the local area in the past few months which has prompted me to update you with a few tips to help and local numbers/websites you can have to hand in an emergency.



Do this first -

- Contact the Maidstone Borough Council Dog Warden: The local authority handles collecting all stray dogs found in the borough. Call them to report your dog missing and check if they have already collected it.
- Notify Your Microchip Company: Immediately phone the database where your dog's microchip is registered and report them as missing. This ensures your contact details are up-to-date and prevents anyone from illegally changing the chip details. You may need to use a service like [Petlog](#) if they are your provider.
- Check the Immediate Area: Search the area where your dog was last seen, including local parks or familiar walking spots. Ask neighbours to check their gardens, sheds, and garages where a frightened pet might hide or become trapped. Bring their favourite treats/toys or bedding to help lure them out with familiar smells and sounds. Your dog may go into survival mode and become scared or anxious so be mindful not to chase but to gently call their name and remain calm without showing you are panicking or worried and they may bolt. Approach the dog with a side on stance, without eye contact to appear unthreatening.

Further Steps -

- Contact Local Vets and Rescues: Notify all local veterinary surgeries and animal rescue centre's in and around Maidstone. Provide them with a detailed description and a photo of your dog, as people often take found pets to a vet or shelter.
- Use social media and Online Databases: Post details and a photo of your dog on local lost and found pet groups. The Facebook groups "MAIDSTONE PETS KENT UK lost found stolen" and "Lost And Found Cats and dogs In Maidstone" are useful community platforms for this purpose. You should also register your dog as missing on national databases such as [Animal Search UK](#).
- Create and Distribute Flyers: Make flyers with a clear, recent photo of your dog, a brief description, the last known location, and your contact information. Post them in your local area, including community boards, supermarkets, and pet stores.
- Visit Local Shelters Regularly: Do not just rely on phone calls; visit local shelters in person to check all kennels, as descriptions can sometimes be subjective.
- Don't Give Up: 90% of lost dogs are reunited. Persist with your search efforts. Many lost pets are reunited with their owners after days or even weeks.

Come along to a candle lit, All Saints Church West Farleigh, to join in with your friends and villagers.

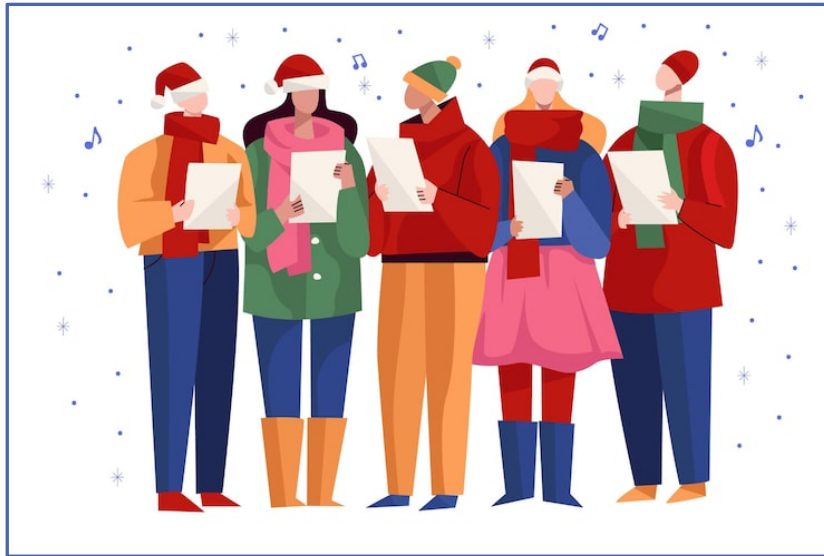
Sing the traditional Carols and listen to the familiar Readings. Bring the children, they will be invited to bring, the locally carved figures, up to the crib.

VILLAGE HISTORY

The church in West Farleigh was built in the 1100's and has seen many changes. A church historian visited recently and was excited to find a Low Window. DOWN ON THE FARM WITH DAN

Becks' sheep are back in the field just off Teston Lane / Mill Lane. To quote a line from June is Bustin' Out All Over (Rodgers & Hammerstein's Carousel), "All the rams that chase the ewe sheep are determined there'll be new sheep". But it doesn't happen in June, it happens in Autumn.

Some of Becks' ewes have orange markings on their hindquarters, and some have blue markings. But how did those markings get there?



There is a ram in that field, along with the 38 ewes. It's his job to get them all pregnant. Usually mating rams have a block of dye strapped to their chest, and that's how the ewes get their extra splash of colour as he mounts them. Instead of crayon, Becks uses raddle (powdered livestock dye) mixed with vegetable oil, which she smears onto the ram's chest. Using a block and harness system means having to make frequent adjustments whenever the block slips out of place. The orange dye stays on for the first two weeks, then it gets changed for a blue one. That's how Becks knows that the ram is keen and doing his job. Also, she knows which ewes have been "served", and approximately when. This is also useful at lambing time, as it indicates which ewes are likely to give birth first.

Most farmers with barns arrange the ram and ewes to get together in September or October. However, Becks arranges it for November and early December. The lambs will be born in April, which is more convenient for her. She doesn't have a barn, so lambing in March is too early for her.

Over the five weeks the ram is there, he can cope with up to 50 ewes. Becks only has 38 in the field, so there's some spare capacity available. The ram is on a high protein diet to make sure he's got the energy to deliver the goods. Ewes have a cycle of 13-19 days, so on average they will have two cycles during the 35 days the ram is available. They are only in heat for two days during each cycle so a single encounter with the ram is not enough to guarantee a pregnancy. Thus the ram is expected to serve each ewe more than once during his visit. He's going to be busy!



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
