Fluttering around Elm Trees

The White-letter Hairstreak Butterfly relies on elm trees to breed, they are brown with a white coloured letter W on the underparts of their wings, hence the name. They are difficult to spot as they tend to flutter around the treetops, but they do take nectar from brambles, so it is possible to see them lower down from June to August.

Aye there's the rub! With our disappearing elm trees, these butterflies are not known to be in our area.

The Kent County Council 'Plan Tree Strategy' looks at a wide range of issues with regard to tree planting in Kent and improving their associated biodiversity. The funding for the provision of these developed disease resistant varieties of elms has been provided by Network Rail Community Tree Planting Programme in partnership with the Tree Council; and these trees have been made available for planting across the area with the idea of developing corridors to support these and other butterflies that are dependent on them. The Elm Heritage Society has been developing these disease resistant elm varieties and we have been lucky to receive ten of these plants.

As soon as our hedge plants arrive, we are planting four as standards within the hedge line that will cut across the width of our field to make a joined corridor with another hedge and trees at the other end. We have already planted six of them as a broad cluster to create a wooded pasture on the field where the foot path runs through. Anyone using the footpath can watch their progress as they put on height and the canopy expands; and look out for the White-letter Hairstreak Butterflies. The intention is to develop more corridors of elm trees throughout the area and who knows, the White-letter Hairstreak Butterfly may be another butterfly we see around Hunton.

Snowdrop Sunday

It may have rained heavily on 15th February but that did not stop the snowdrops from looking serene in the gloom of a damp afternoon. Moreover, the bad weather did not stop the event from being its most successful so far. To start the day, David Jones led the 'Snowdrop Service' with a collection of prayers, hymns and thoughts about nature and the wonders of our world. The service ended with a snowdrop blessing: *"Into a dark world a snowdrop comes, a benison of hope and peace, carrying within it a green heart, a symbol of God's renewing love."*

Later that day, the church was filled with a buzz of friendly chatter, laughter and enthusiasm to purchase the many varieties of snowdrop on sale. Of course, the most popular was our very own 'Hunton Giant', which sold out almost immediately! Our thanks go to Sue Pinks, Lesley Lee and Helen Towner for donating the snowdrops. Fay Joyce and Helen Towner chatted enthusiastically about varieties, helping us all to recognise the individual shapes and patterns of the tiny flowers, "Wow" was heard several times, as people looked more closely at each flower's intricate emerald markings.

Snowdrop Sunday was truly a joyous community event, one in which we welcomed old friends as well as new people, some travelling considerable distances to visit St Mary's. We lost count of how many actually attended, although judging by the amount of washing up, we estimate close to 80 visitors, including several dogs! So many visitors spoke about their love of snowdrops heralding spring. It was moving to hear also how these delicate flowers capture memories of family who are no longer with us! As William Wordsworth wrote, "Snowdrops, venturesome harbinger of spring and pensive monitor of fleeting years".

Most importantly, we thank you all for your very kind donations of delicious cakes, as well as your help in making the event such a community occasion. For the second year we were very pleased to welcome back Amelie and Daisy, our youngest helpers, well done girls!

There were two particular highlights to the afternoon. Thanks to James Forster and David Jones, many historical artefacts were on display that had been hidden in cupboards for years; this captured the interest of so many. We have just received an email saying how thrilled one of our visitors was to find information about an aunt who died as a child choking on an apple whilst with her family hop picking. At 3pm, the church was filled with a wonderful selection of organ music, as played by our organist Marian Goodsill; this was much enjoyed by all. To end this article, I have to tell you that our takings were £588, which exceeded last year by £176. So, thank you for coming.

Playing Along with the Scammers

I have had a series of calls from different UK mobile numbers to tell me that my O2 call plan had run out and each time I said I do not take cold calls and asked for my number to be removed. Each time I blocked the number. Then it occurred to me that next time they rang it might be useful to actually write down the conversation with the scammers up to the point where they ask for financial information and then hang up. Having watched BBCs 'scam detectors' many times I had a pretty good idea of how this might go – and I wasn't disappointed. So here, as well as I can remember it, is the conversation:

Me – “Hello” **Him** – “Hello is that Stephen?” **Me** – “Who is calling please?” **Him** – “Hello Stephen, my name is Rajesh and I am calling from O2 customer service about your call plan. Your plan has expired and you will not be able to use O2 unless you sign up for a new plan” (*warning sign #1 – already applying pressure*). **Me** – “OK, before we go on, why does my phone show that you are calling from a UK mobile number?” **Him** – “We do this all the time, it saves O2 money. (*warning sign #2 – O2 do not do this*). Now your call plan has, as I said expired, in fact it expired last year. If you are still wanting to make calls we need to sign you up to a new call plan but to identify the best one for you we need to take some details.” **Me** – “What sort of details?” **Him** – “Details about how you use your phone. Number of calls, texts, time on-line that sort of thing”. We then had a discussion where I gave him some purely fictitious numbers and general statements about internet usage (somewhat exaggerated I must admit).

Him – “That’s great. Well I think I have the ideal plan for you and the good news is it gives you more calls and texts and much more data. Even better news is that it is cheaper than your current plan” (*warning sign #3 – if it sounds too good to be true it probably is!*) I decided to act dumb. **Me** - “how much are we talking about per month?” **Him** – “How much do you pay at the moment?” **Me** – “I can’t remember, you must be able to see my record there, can’t you tell me?” **Him** – “Er, let me see.” He then quoted a range of monthly payment amounts which were nothing like the amount I actually pay” (*warning sign #4 – they did not know what I paid*) “and the new plan is 25% cheaper” (*see warning sign #3*). **Me** – “I need to think about it if that’s OK” **Him** – “This offer is a short term one so you need to sign up today if you want to take advantage of it” (*Warning sign #5 – more pressure being applied*). **Me** – “I am not happy about doing this but what do you need from me?” **Him** – “We need to amend your standing order”. **Me** - “I am not happy about doing anything financial over the phone. I am close to an O2 shop so I will go in there tomorrow and talk about this new plan. I’d be happier that way”. **Him** – “Of course you can do that, but this offer is NOT available through O2 shops. Look let me connect you with the sign-up team and they will be able to put your mind at rest – they do this all the time”. The phone went dead for few moments and then a lady came on the phone. (*Scam detectors say this is a common technique with the two people often sitting just a few yards from each other with the second one, usually female, listening in to the original conversation*).

Her – Hello Stephen, I understand from my colleague that you want to sign up to a new call plan. We have all the information on your requirements and all we need is to change your direct debit details. Firstly, can I confirm your email address” (*Warning sign #6 – the address they had was 10 years out of date*). **Me** – “Yes that’s right”. **Her** – “OK – can I have your bank sort code and account number please?” **Me** – “Sorry, I am not happy giving financial information over the phone. **Her** – “There is no need to worry Stephen, even the postman can find out this information”.

I thought it had gone on for long enough. **Me** – “I know you are scammers. I am ending this call now. I have taken notes of this call and will be reporting it to the authorities. Goodbye”

I called O2 and reported this – it is a scam of which they are aware. We are publishing this in the hope that it might just help stop someone being scammed. PS – the phone calls have stopped.
