Parish Council AGM and Annual Parish Meeting

May has been a busy month for the Parish Council. On the 11th May the PC AGM took place where the chair and vicechair were elected. There was no change from last year, so David Heaton and Mike Summersgill were confirmed in those offices.

There was a discussion and decision made on priorities that came from the Parish Survey made earlier this year, improved traffic control measures to be pursued, improvements to the play area, repainting of the village entrance gates, new doors for the village hall and steps to improve broadband speeds where possible were among the items confirmed.

Confirmation was also made regarding the mobile CCTV camera which is at present operating in the village to catch and deter fly tipping.

On the 18th May the Annual Parish Meeting took place in the village hall. A guest speaker, Tim Higgs, from Broadband for Rural Kent gave a presentation regarding possible methods and options to improve higher speed internet to parishioners. The PC is likely to use his services to gain data on existing infrastructure to help with more bespoke options for parishioners in future. Another speaker gave a short presentation about the new Heart of Kent Hospice to be built beside the Greensands Surgery in Linton.

Presentations were made by village organisations and clubs informing the meeting of their past endeavours and future plans. As has become somewhat of a tradition, the Annual Parish Meeting has come to celebrate the very best that our community has to offer, made richer by the many people who give their time and effort to organising events and group activities. This year it was our opportunity to recognise and thank a couple who have invested so much of their energy into the running of the Hunton Village Club. David Heaton (Parish Council Chair) presented the 2026 KALC Community Award to Kerry and Kevin Larkin. Speaking on behalf of the couple, Kerry expressed how they both enjoyed contributing to village life and the pleasure they derive from organising events at the club.

Years 3-5 had the chance of a lifetime being invited by the Williams F1 Team to their Headquarters in Oxfordshire. This was all free to us and generously funded by Williams so we could take part in a hands-on day of learning aimed at inspiring the next generation of scientists, engineers, and innovators. We explored key areas of the Williams technology campus, including the team's world-famous heritage collection, where they got up close to legendary race cars driven by the likes of F1 champions Nigel Mansell, Damon Hill, and Alain Prost. We even got to hold a £50,000 steering wheel and a £250,000 side panel from the present driver's car - Alex Albon. The highlight for many was a chance to race in state-of-the-art simulators and take on a real-world design challenge: dividing into teams to design, build and crash-test a model F1 nosecone.

A walk with my Aunt...

Over Easter I set out on one of my regular local walks, estimating it would take me about an hour. What I hadn't bargained for was how easily distracted my walking companion would be and that our walk would take us a good two hours. My Auntie Monica's late husband Mike was, for many years, deputy chairman of the Kent Wildlife Trust, so I might have guessed she'd share his love of the natural world. The first things to catch her eye were the 'milkmaids' — also known as the cuckoo flower or lady's smock — growing in the verges and field edges. They are delicate and mauve, but I couldn't understand her fascination and need to stop at each one and inspect it. It turns out she was looking for the eggs of the orange-tip butterfly. When the caterpillars emerge from their eggs, they eat the shell, then eat all the other eggs around them so that only one caterpillar survives on each flower head. As if on cue, we then saw several adult orange-tip butterflies over on the other side of the River Beult.

As we ambled through the meadows, sunshine caught the often-overlooked flowers such as dandelions, bugle and white dead-nettle, reminding us of their importance. Each is a key source of nectar for drowsy bumblebees coming out of hibernation... so spare them some thought next time you're tempted to pick up the strimmer. We then headed into the bluebell woods. Bluebell woods should never be rushed, what with their amazing scent and incredible colour. Along with wood anemones (the white, star-shaped flowers on the woodland floor) bluebells are an indicator of ancient woodland, meaning that the woodland has been there for more than 400 years — often much, much longer.

On that note we couldn't miss wandering over to the 'magic tree'; the enormous, ancient oak, close to the river. Each limb is about the size of a large tree trunk so, combined, one can only guess at its overall circumference ... or how old it might be. In recent months a limb has dropped to the ground, revealing more of the oak's hollow centre. Given the tree's size and level of decay, it would probably class as a 'veteran' tree — anything over 400 years and it's definitely ancient. It was reassuring to see a ring of saplings growing around the enormous parent tree... As the old tree dies, life continues. Oaks offer the highest biodiversity of any tree species... and I know for certain there's a resident barn owl in this one. So, next time you're out for a walk, give yourself a little extra time... Think what I would have missed if I'd rushed home for hot-crossed buns.

An Example of Victorian Charity

I was recently handed a 125-year-old splendidly-scarlet leather-bound book bought from the Army & Navy Store in Victoria Street. The book was acquired by Lt Col Arthur Close Borton and presented to his mother-in-law, Mrs Emmeline Bethea Alexander of Cheveney after she gifted Peace Cottages to the Diocese of Canterbury in 1899.

The book records that Peace Cottages, initially built by Thomas Duncome Eden (formerly Duncome Shafto) were to be held in trust to house "aged or infirm persons, members of the Church of England and inhabitants, past or present, of Hunton." The initial residents were Widow Hannah Wyman (85), Widow Anne Botten (74), Widow Mary Anne Godsmark (74), Widow Jane Solman (66) and the Parish Nurse, Nurse Haddon. Later names referenced include Smith, Neale, Startup, Collins, Allard, Coomber, Harris, Clout and Norton.

The book also refers to Mrs Alexander endowing the charitable trust with a further £6,000 (equivalent to £626,000 today) to be invested in India 3% stock, the income from which was intended to fund the running costs and maintenance of the properties.

Thomas Shafto was born in Beamish Hall, County Durham (3rd son of the owner) and in 1845 he married Dulcibella Moore, daughter of the Rector of Hunton at that time. They established a home for themselves in Cheveney but sadly she died in 1849. They had no children and he never remarried. It appears that the Drummonds/Alexanders and Shaftos/Edens both lived in Cheveney at the same time and that Mrs Alexander was the sole beneficiary to an estate worth about £6m in today's terms under Thomas Eden's will.

Mrs Alexander (as the wife of Major General Henry Drummond who died in 1868 - she remarried in 1870) was an interesting woman who Queen Victoria had asked to accept Indian Princess Victoria Gouramma as her ward. This request was made after a Lady in Waiting, Lady Login, noted Mrs Drummond's remarkable success educating her own two daughters (who went on to marry Lt Col. Arthur Close Borton and Col. William John Vousden VC). Lady Login's husband served in India and though this connection she accompanied deposed Maharajah Dulip Singh when he gifted the Kho I Noor to Queen Victoria in 1854.

It is interesting to note that Cheveney has connections to two Generals, an Air Vice Marshall, four Colonels, a Group Captain, two VC holders and a holder of a DFC and bar – all within the last 150 years and within the same extended family!
